Naaseh v'nishma. "We will do, and we will hear, understand." According to Torah, these were Israel's words at Sinai. A ragtag, mixed multitude, a devoted and diverse people promised to embrace a covenant of love, of responsibility, of obligation, and of faith.

We heard, we saw, we experienced, we remember. Jews like to pray communally, and they insist on it when it comes to reciting certain significant prayers. The Barchu, Kaddish, Aleynu, and reading from Torah require the presence of ten Jews.

Once upon certain congregational times, communities loathe to openly count in synagogue (it's rude to point) used the sentence after Ma Tovu to check on whether a minyan was present. Each congregant would read one word from that sentence. Va'ani b'rov chasdecha avo veitecha eshtachaveh el haichal kodsh'cha b'yirtecha (in English: "Your great lovingkindness brings me to your house and in awe I bow down in Your holy space"). Ten words, ten voices, ten people, gevalt! - a min-

Why do we seek that tenth person for a minyan? It's not just about the number, it's about the principle. With at least a minyan present, we pray in and with a community around us, we pray not to "my God" but "our God." How do you know that if ten people pray together the Divine presence is with them? Psalm 82 says: "God stands in the congregation of God."


Our prayers, our services, our minyans - these things remind us that we received Torah as a community. They mandate that we pray as a community. In a minyan, in a group, we are reminded that we are not isolated – in joy or sorrow, in dilemma or in confusion. Though we stand

before God as individuals responsible for our own actions, we are aware that we are not alone and that we do not act alone. The Torah was given to us at Sinai.

"Religion," writes Rabbi Reuven Hammer, "is not what we do with our aloneness, but what we do with our togetherness." At Sinai, we accepted Torah as a community; it is our continuing (and joyous) obligation to act Torah as a community.
