MiLev HaPardes From the heart of the orchard by Dr. Barbara Thiede, student rabbi

A wealthy guest entered an inn in some forgotten town in Poland. He saw a beggar in the fover, and treated him with open contempt.

"Get out of my way, you!" he said, and pushed him roughly.

Later, the man learned that the beggar was really Reb Zusia and he returned to the inn to express his remorse.

"Forgive me, Rebbe," he cried. "You must forgive me, for I didn't know?"

"Why do you ask Zusia to forgive you?" Reb Zusia asked, shaking his head and smiling gently. "You haven't done anything bad to him! It wasn't Reb Zusia that you insulted, but a beggar. Go and ask the beggars everywhere to forgive you!"

In just a few days, August 20th on the Gregorian calendar, we open the month of Elul, the final month in the Jewish liturgical year. Elul is a month of reflection, of introspection.

The shofar is sounded each day of Elul. Why? Tradition says that Moses went back up the mountain on Rosh Chodesh Elul to receive the second tablets, the tablets that would be – this time – co-created by divine and human energies. The shofar was sounded daily in order to remind the Israelites to pay close attention to the state of their souls.

According to Maimonides the sound of the shofar is the call to teshuva, to the self-examination that culminates in Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement.

Our legends and liturgical practice, our stories and our theology - they give us many opportunities to reflect and consider, to take stock of who we are and who we would like to become.

Why do many Jews say the Shema Hamitah at night (the bedtime Shema)? Because the texts surrounding the bedtime Shema ask us both to forgive those who have hurt us and to reflect on who we may have hurt that day.

Who did we push away?



Who did we treat with impatience or contempt? We could change so much with a few moments of daily reflection. We could become more compassionate and understanding, less demanding

and insistent if we asked ourselves each night where we missed the mark during the day.

The shofar sounds inside our souls, calling us to teshuva, return and atonement. Not just during Elul. Not only on Yom Kippur.

Who was that beggar at the door?

Our Religious School Committee has been hard at work this summer preparing the curriculum and lesson plans for a fun-filled and challenging school year. Many thanks to Jody Mace, Richard Jacobson, Jill Partridge, Teresa and Judah Malin; Ginger Jensen (Ritual Committee); Lisa Boguslaw (Social Committee) and Reb Barbara who have been working together closely to coordinate the classes and events planned for the year.

The first day of school will be 9/13.
