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SURELY GOD IS IN THIS PLACE, AND I DID NOT KNOW IT (GEN 26.18)

Anxiety makes us fearful. In our vulnerability, we call on God. It is in such moments that we are forced to admit that we need help, to confess – even to ourselves – that we don't want to be left alone.

Fleeing from his enraged brother, Esau, Jacob dreams of the divine. God's own angels traverse the way between heaven and earth before him. God, Jacob decides upon wakening, was "in this place." He himself had no idea, no clue.

During this service, we will focus on our own questions about God's presence in our lives. Who and what is God? Why does God seem absent, or uncaring? When does God seem to be involved with the actualities of human existence?

'SHE IS MORE IN THE RIGHT THAN I...'

(GEN38:26)

Tamar, a Canaanite woman, shows her Israelite father-in-law, Judah, how to follow the Torah's commandments. In the end, Judah has to admit that an outsider has fulfilled mitzvot he has willfully ignored.

Tanakh surprises us, again and again, with depictions of outsiders who demonstrate the righteousness Israelites ascribe to. Jewish history is filled with similar stories – of the ancient "God-fearers" who worshipped alongside Jews in the synagogues of late antiquity to non-Jewish spouses of today who support and sustain Jewish congregations across the country.

At this Thanksgiving service, we'll explore the historic role of the righteous non-Jewish resident in our shared history. We'll give thanks, too, for all those who continue to support and sustain our project of building a sacred community.

And we'll continue our Temple Or Olam Thanksgiving tradition: Bring your leftovers of all kinds for oneg! We'll be grateful!

FROM THE HEART OF THE ORCHARD

Recently, I offered our congregation a learning service. Those who attended heard jokes and stories about the way Jews pray, about the components of the service, and even about how we carry our Torah. They also heard answers to questions they didn't even know they had. Examples?

- ⇔ Why do we stand during the last verses of Lecha Dodi?
- ⇔ Why does a song of tri-

umph (Mi Chamocha) follow paragraph after paragraph of injunctions and reminders to study the mitzvot and practice them?

★ Why do we stand for the Amidah without having a clue why we don't stand for the Shema? Isn't the latter the central creed of Judaism?

I was surprised (and delighted) by the feedback.

One congregational member insisted that we offer just such a service at least twice a year. Another said he had never known one bit of what he'd learned that day -- and he'd been given a yeshiva education. Everyone seemed to feel happier about what they were doing during the service.

It isn't really so surprising. When you get the *why* instead of just the *how* things just make more

sense. Acting out a form without knowing how it's intended to function seems meaningless in any venue. To participate fully, people have to have some reason to engage.

The rabbis who put together our liturgy had a schema in mind that we fail to understand for a simple reason: Most of us are not literate in their language, and can't see the transitions and the intentions that are embedded in the script. Ironically, my b'nai mitzvah students typically end up



knowing lots more about the whys than their parents because even if they don't understand Hebrew, the educational process we go through helps them understand what they are singing, and why.

I'm planning on offering this service again. I like to imagine all of you understanding the intentions behind the pages in your

hands. I promise that if you learn more about those intentions, your own will become much clearer, your participation more joyous, and your prayer deeper and more rewarding.

So please keep a look-out for our next learning-the-service Shabbat. Learn to be a questioner. Find out why.


