MAY 13TH: SHABBAT SERVICE

It shall be a jubilee for you... Leviticus 25:10.

In this week's parsha, B'har, the Israelites are given a vision of a world of equals. According to the laws of this parsha, no human being can be condemned to perpetual servitude, there are provisions for the forgiveness of debts, and every fifty years all land returns to its original owners. Since all the earth and its inhabitants belong to God, no one can lay exclusive and permanent claim to land or people.

The rabbis say that this parsha teaches us that all human beings deserve the respect and care that prevents their utter degradation. But to care for each other, we must know that we are connected. At this service, we'll hear a story that tells us why understanding that we are connected is the key to our survival, our freedom, and our chance at a jubilee of our own.

Numbers 4:19.

B'midbar, the first parsha of the book of Numbers, opens with Moses' injunction to take a census of the Israelites. But it ends with detailed instructions for Aaron and his sons regarding the Kohathites, the group of priests responsible for transporting sacred objects.

The text tells us that this job is a dangerous one. Aaron and his sons are to follow specific steps to ensure that the Kohathites will be able to perform their duties safely. What made the Kohathites' task so dangerous? Does this brief passage hold a message for us?

FROM THE HEART OF THE ORCHARD

Every Sunday, some of our congregants gather in virtual, but sacred space. At 5:00 we telephone in to a free conference call line. We go around our virtual room and check in with each other. We say a blessing together: Baruch atah Adonai, Eloheinu Melech Ha'Olam asher kidshanu b'mitzvotav v'tzivanu la'asok b'divrei Torah. It's a sweet commandment. The Hebrew text, after all,

asks us to *la'asok* (immerse) *b'divrei* (in words) of Torah.

Our group has been meeting for almost two years. Every year we pass through the vibrant and familiar stories of family dysfunction in Genesis (*Bereishit*), the tales of our liberation in Exodus (*Shemot*), the challenging legal codes of Leviticus (*Vayikra*), the narrative of our time in the desert in Numbers

(*Bemidbar*), and Moses' extended speech to his people in Deuteronomy (*D'varim*).

Every week I ask the participants what spoke to them, troubled them, made them curious or just plain dumbfounded. Every week we find that the words we immerse ourselves touch us in some way.

It's easy to relate in some way to the pain Esau feels

when he finds his brother has stolen his blessing. Many times, we discover the things that touch and move us in the first five minutes of our study time together. Sometimes, it takes longer.

Recently, we read how Leviticus decrees a Sabbath rest every seven years for the land of Israel. The same text mandates that every

fiftieth year, all land reverts back to its original owners. Legislation that advocated recreating economic equality for all seemed far off and unattainable for all our group's members.

But then we began thinking about what the Sabbath rest and a Jubilee year could mean for us? What would it mean to think about ways in which we can provide land the rest it needs or to help establish a world in which the gulf between haves and have-nots contracts rather than expands?

What would be our definition of a "Jubilee year"? One member of our study group mentioned that she felt her Jubilee year occurred the year she retired. Now

she can spend all the time she wants volunteering for causes she supports. Another participant thought her Jubilee year would be one in which she could maintain daily mindful-

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ness about matters spiritual – for her, a mindfully led spiritual life leads to engaging in healing the world.


