FROM THE HEART OF THE ORCHARD

And you shall not glean your vineyard, nor shall you gather every grape of your vineyard; you shall leave them for the poor and stranger; I am the Lord your God (Leviticus

19:9-10).

Speak up for those who cannot speak for themselves, for the rights of all who are destitute.

Speak up and judge fairly; defend the rights of the poor and needy (Proverbs 31:8-9).

Defend the poor and fatherless; Do justice to the afflicted and needy (Psalm 82:3)

You have been a refuge for the poor, a refuge for the needy in his distress, a shelter from the storm and a shade from the heat (Isaiah 25:4).

Can you imagine spending hours marking packages of toilet paper and paper towels, sorting out diapers, and taping cartons back together – and, what's more, enjoying every minute?

That's what happened last May, when a team of twenty-two Temple Or Olam Tikkun-Olamers headed to the Metrolina Food Bank in Charlotte. About half a dozen members of the UNCC Interfaith Alliance, a student group I advise on campus, joined us.

Before we got started, we encircled Ginger and Leanna Jensen. We took a few moments to mark the yahrzeit of Ginger's mother, Mary Dare Roettger. Our Mourner's Kaddish was sweet and heartfelt, connecting us with the students among us, and reminding us how easy it is to care for one another.

Then we received instruction on our tasks, divided into two groups, and set to work.

One group stayed serious. The other immediately made its nature known by joking, teasing, and generally giggling its way through the mountain of paper goods. Both groups worked very hard indeed.

Toilet paper packages flew through the air, tape machines whirred, and everyone got their hands covered in the black ink of Sharpie markers. You could not imagine how much fun we had.

Why?


We were working together at a task that mattered to us all – caring for the homeless and hungry. The fellowship, the instant sense of community that moved us was immediately apparent.

We had fun because some of our children were there; adults felt that they were teaching our children well. We know that there are many more human beings out there that need our help than we can possibly imagine. We know that the world is filled with need and brokenness. But we also know that we are not so helpless, that we can act.

We plan to go back to the Food Bank. We thank Ally Billings for arranging our day there.

We *want* to sort and organize donations, repair broken cartons, and know that we are helping to make it possible for even the poorest parents to have diapers and baby food for their infant.

Our Torah reminds us, again and again, to care for those in need. May we take every opportunity to do just that.
