There are places in our services to honor doubt or sadness. Love of any kind is subject to challenge and change.

On August 17th, we will experience Kabbalat Shabbat service as a series of beloved love songs.

This column is about our congregants and what they do for a living or their hobbies or things they've done for the congregation (and mishpoche means Family!)

This month's mispoche pick is **Yvette Spivock**. Yvette is originally from a small farm town of 600 people south of Chicago. She attended University of South Florida in Tampa and majored in Communications with a minor in Cultural Anthropology. After college, she worked in New Orleans for a patent attorney and watched the cruise ships come into port right by her office. She called and joined the cruise line and stayed on board with various cruise companies for seven years doing everything from Social Hostess to Shore Excursions to Cruise Director.

She debarked in Ft. Lauderdale and started leasing interior mall space (kiosks, coffee carts, etc.) and was eventually transferred to Las Vegas. Her office was next to Bill, her future husband, who worked in commercial real estate (his own business). When the real estate market started to go bad, they decided to start a new venture.

They moved to Tampa and owned and operated a USA Baby store for 4 years. It was a hard time to open a new store as it was shortly after 9-11. Yvette calls 2004 the Year of the Hurricanes – there were 5 hurricanes that year, and four of them headed their way. During the hurricanes, they had evacuated to Charlotte where Bill's parents were living, where "the sky was blue" and the weather was beautiful.

A year later, Yvette and Bill moved to Charlotte with their children, son Bryston (age 8 at the time) and daughter Emory (age 6 at the time). Both "kids," who are now ages 16 and 14, are studying with Rabbi Barbara to become Bar and Bat Mitzvah in October. The family will send out more information later, but for now they want everyone to "Save the Date" of 10/20/12.



Bill went back into real estate and Yvette stayed home with the children. Once the kids were in middle school about a year ago, Yvette was ready to work outside the home again. She started working at Discovery Place and then started a job at Emory's school – Charlotte Preparatory School.

In their spare time, Yvette and Emory volunteer with the Carolina Waterfowl Rescue (for four years now). After a recent windstorm, the group needs donations of construction materials such as fencing and chicken wire to replace damaged cages and fences. This waterfowl rescue group is one of the largest in the southeast region. Charlotte also has one of very few exotic birds rescue groups in the country, called Parrot University. Birds are flown in from around the country.

Yvette and Emory also volunteer with Animal Rehabilitators of the Carolinas (ARC). This group specializes in small animal rescue such as bunnies, squirrels and chipmunks. In NC they do not handle raccoons, skunks, foxes or bats due to the possibility of the animals' carrying rabies. ARC has a huge network, and the volunteers specialize in different animals. The laws are different in NC and SC, so there are "raccoon people" in SC.

Yvette and her family like to hike at DuPont National Forest, which is about two hours from Charlotte, near Brevard. This is a favorite day trip because it has three waterfalls, easy hiking, good camping, and it's a fast and easy trip. It's near Hendersonville, which offers restaurants and cute shops. The family likes to kayak on Mountain Island Lake.

Yvette also likes to read, write and play piano. She will be starting a day tripper blog about day trips in the Charlotte area. She likes to blog about nifty places in the area – within a couple of hours of Charlotte. However, it will probably not be up and running until after the family's B'nei Mitzvah.

When asked about what she likes best about Temple Or Olam, she quickly rattled off – the rabbi, the people, the music and the services. Then she said that what she really likes best is that her kids will forego sleepovers with friends and other fun activities in order to go to the Temple.

HIGH HOLY DAYS INTENSIVE COURSE WITH RABBI BARBARA

For some of us, the liturgy surrounding the High Holidays can be problematic. Does it speak to the way we actually live or to the way we really understand God? Does it have to be so painful?

On August 11th and 18th, Rabbi Barbara will be offering an intensive course on the architecture of the High Holy Days. Participants will be exploring what Torah says about the Days of Awe and what the rabbis and Jewish communities later made of them. The class will also explore the prayers that are unique to the season and (re)discover what our intentions might be as we enter the month of Elul and the days of reflection and consideration.

Day One's morning session, from 10-12 noon, will present an overview of Jewish service structures and what the Torah actually says about Rosh Hashanah. There will then be a break for lunch, and study will continue in the afternoon from 1-3 pm, delving into the actual liturgy of Rosh Hashanah. Day Two's morning hours will cover Elul and S'lichot. The afternoon will be spent wrestling with the history and liturgy of Yom Kippur.
