What's in a Word?



Say "Hanukkah" and what comes to mind? Lights and latkes, songs and gifts, celebration and family gettogethers.

Perhaps we recall the stories about the brave Maccabees and their struggles to free our ancestors from oppression and persecution. Or we remember the miracle that transformed a tiny cruse of oil meant for one day so that it would last eight full days.

The word hanukkah means "dedication" or "consecration."
The Maccabean revolt ended with the painful discovery that the heart of Jewish spiritual life – the Temple – had been defiled and desecrated. Our ancestors saw the altar destroyed, the sanctuary attacked. They labored to

cleanse and rebuild.

We celebrate, in Hanukkah, the rededication of the Temple, the hope of a world made whole and sweet and safe for our people, for all people, in fact.

The rabbis parse *hanukkah* to extract additional meanings. The first letters of *hanukkah*, they say, come from the Hebrew *shoresh* (root) *chet-nun-hey*. That root means "to settle oneself," "to rest."

The letters that follow are also numbers. In in this case the kaf and the hey add up to twenty-five. So, the rabbis say, hanukkah also means, "on the twenty-fifth they rested." We celebrate Hanukkah on the 25^{th} of the Hebrew month Kislev. On the 25^{th} of Kislev our ancestors settled themselves. They rested. The battle was over.

We, too, need time to let go the struggles and battles of the world. At Hanukkah, we can do so in the light of the *hanukkia* – soft and gentle light, indeed.

Hebrew numbers, like letters and words, carry multiple associations. The twenty-fifth word in Torah is *ohr*, "light." We celebrate the festival of lights on the twenty-fifth day of the darkest month in the year.

Hanukkah is about dedicating ourselves to discovering the light inside us, the light that needs to be nourished and strengthened in order to illuminate a world filled with darkness.

Now, take just the first two letters of hanukkah: They are a chet and a nun. The word that results is heyn, "grace." When we watch the lights of the hanukkia, the menorah with the eight branches, flicker, what do we see? The fragility of light in the darkness? The illumination in the faces of our beloved ones?

Grace is a gift to be found in this holiday of lights.

Passover tells us about the light of freedom. Shavuot reminds us of the light of Torah. The Days of Awe speak to the light of forgiveness.

Hanukkah calls us to acknowledge a time of resting and reflection.

Hanukkah asks us: What can or should we reconsecrate, rededicate, in our own lives? Hanukkah invites us to consider the gifts of grace we can find in our lives It's all in a word.
