Light the Menorah and Serve up a Little Thanks...

It's Thanksgivukkah!



e are lucky to be alive at this particular time.

After all, what is happening this November is not going to happen again for tens of thousands of years. Secular time and Jewish time are intersecting in wonderful and strange ways in just a few weeks. This year, Chanukkah is a happening thing on Thanksgiving Day.

The last time such a thing happened was back in 1888

(notice the happy chai that begins that number!). The next time the two holidays will converge, according to Jonathan Mizrahi, a quantum physicist, will be in 76695.

What do these two holidays have in common? An overabundance of food, obviously.

More seriously: The Pilgrims and the Jews of Maccabean times knew what it was to have their right to worship as they pleased challenged. Both holidays are about, in part, giving thanks for the gifts of wholeness and peace.

One way the rabbis extract additional meanings from the word *Chanukkah* is to point out that the first three letters of the word, *chet-nun-hey*, form a root that means 'to settle oneself,' 'to rest.' That might be worth remembering this Thanksgiving. We could commit to settling and resting, to spending time with family and friends instead of the clothing racks and shelves of electronics at the local mall.

We began 5774 focusing on the many meanings of the root *shinn-bet-ayin*, a root that evokes beautifully varied meanings, from simple abundance to making a pledge or a vow. *Shinn-bet-ayin* also stands for seven, the number of completion.

Most of you, I hope, still have your Books of Seven. May I make a suggestion?

Take advantage of the overlapping holidays. On Thanksgiving (and Chanukkah!), express your thanks for the gifts you have received in your lives. Then, dedicate those first seven nights of the

festival of rededication to thanksgiving. Put cards and Post-It notes under the chanukkiah and then light the candles. Express the abundance and gratitude you feel. Keep the notes and cards in your Books of Seven along with the poetry and notes from High Holy Days. Remember the vows you made at the beginning of the New Year? Remember the celebrations of wholeness, the hopes you felt? Take the first seven days of Chanukkah to rededicate yourself, to permit yourself time for settling and resting.

Thanksgiving and Chanukkah will never happen again in our lifetimes in quite this way. May yours be filled with an awareness of your blessings, a conscious acknowledgement of your gratitude, and a rededication to creating a world filled with wholeness and peace.

Our Partner in 3D: Dove House Children's Advocacy Center

Several Temple Or Olam members attended the fall Dove House fundraising luncheon on September 10. The Dove House Children's Advocacy Center serves sexually-abused children with concern for their personal welfare as well as their non-offending family members, focusing on healing. Prosecutors and government agencies work with Dove House to create a safe place for children to be able to share their experience and get justice. Dove House Advocates guide each child through the entire process from their interview with the authorities to court appearances and at trial. In one of the speeches at the event, an Advocate spoke of her struggle as she spends her days working with the children and helping them through their process: 'I can't explain the unexplainable; I just try to make sense of the unthinkable.'

Know your ALEPH-BET

The Chet

Rabbi Benjamin Blech, assoc. prof. of Talmud at Yeshiva University in New York, and Roy Doliner, a tour guide at the Vatican, have just published *The Sistine Secrets: Unlocking the Codes in Michelangelo's Defiant Masterpiece.* The authors have found that Michelangelo had arranged figures in the nine scenes from the Hebrew Bible to suggest letters of the aleph bet. The arrangement of Judith and her handmaiden carrying the head of the Assyrian general Holofernes looks like the letter *chet.* The authors suggest it stands for *chesed* 'loving kindness.' But who knows, it could as well stand for *chai* 'life,' which the general quit when he was a head.

The way in which the letter is traditionally written (as it is in both our Torahs) certainly does bear a resemblance to Michelangelo's fresco: It is a combination of the letters vav followed by zayin, linked by a tent (the technical term is chatoteret). Note that Michelangelo's Judith lifts a cloth over their heads like a tent. The letters vav and zayin refer to the feminine and masculine (and are used as the symbols for the two genders in grammar), so one fond reading of the letter is that it forms a chuppa for the two and makes them one. Maybe in ancient times, the female and the male aspects of God were understood to hold up the sky?

The origin of the letter is a hieroglyph that denoted an enclosure or 'courtyard'; it became the Phoenician letter **\(\infty**, and later the familiar Hebrew \(\pi \).



Numerically, Π has the value 'eight.' Naturally, symbolic references to 8 abound, beyond our eight-day holidays Sukkot and Chanukka:

- ⇒ The traditional day for a Brit Milah is the eighth day after birth (Gen. 17.12);

- The High Priest was decked in eight vestments;
- Eight threads in a tzitzit;
- ☆ And yes, ochos candelicos.

It is a nice letter, the *chet*, if you pronounce it properly ('khet,' not 'tshet' - constrict your throat). It stands for chuppa, chai, chanukkah, chesed... so make a little toast to it next Shabbos. L'chaim!

A Bar Mitzvah Invitation

Apart from Jonathan Sam's friends, the guests will include 50 unruly teenagers, no doubt wearing expensive outfits and fake bling, and 70 middle-aged adults with lots of botox and real bling. At least a quarter of the guests will be hormonally and/or chronologically challenged, while others will act stupid while under the influence of the Palwin table wine we've ordered. And no doubt many will complain about the food (we would hope that you won't be one of them.)
