### News of our Imminent Demise is

### **Greatly Exaggerated**



If you just looked at the headlines, you might feel you have reason to worry.

Recently, newspapers across the country have had a great deal to say about the Pew Report on American Jewish life. Some Jewish leaders termed the report's conclusions downright disastrous for the future of American Jewry. They claimed the study proved that American Jews were less educated, less committed to Jewish institutions, and less religious.

According to the report, the interviewees identified themselves about two thirds of the time as Jews by religion. Around 22%, however, claimed to be Jews of no religion. Those identifying themselves in the latter category described themselves as Jewish by ancestry, ethnicity, and culture. The Pew report claimed that the latter group had tripled since 2000.

As I said on WFAE's 'Charlotte Talks,' the conclusions the Pew report was drawing were based on comparing their numbers with those of the National Jewish Population Survey (NJPS) of 2000. But here's something worth noting: The 2000 study self-consciously chose not to include Jews with "weak" connections to Judaism in their research.

That led to the erroneous conclusion that Jews were far more likely to identify themselves as Jewish by religion thirteen years ago, and that the number of Jews who had decided they were Jews of no religion had skyrocketed in the past decade or so.

Go back, however, to a NJPS 1990 report. In that report, twenty percent of Jews chose 'none' for religion. Twenty-two percent of Jews interviewed in 2013 said they were Jews of no religion. Somehow, 2% over 23 years just doesn't look all that significant a rise in Jews without religious affiliation and ties to me.

What's the point?

Jews have always had lots of ways of identifying as Jewish. Jews are a people group, and our ancestors did not separate religion from culture, ancestry, even geography. Where you were born and whom you were born to determined the kind of religious practices you inherited. Born in Athens? Athena would be the most important deity for you

and yours. Born in Alexandria? Egyptian deities would be your source of divine knowledge and power.

Born in Israel? Your god was YHVH and the temple practice and sacrifice was your people's source of much of its religious ritual.

Here's why I am hopeful about the future of Jews and Judaism:

- ★ Lots of children of intermarried folks are growing up to be Jewish. Intermarriage is not a threat to our people – it's a source of diversity, commitment, and even growth. Just take Temple Or Olam: Our intermarried couples are the most supportive couples you could hope for in the life of a congregation.
- ☼ The total number of Jews in America has risen substantially over the years. In 1990, the estimates put the population at about 5.5. million. Now the best statistics suggest that we weren't counting so well in previous surveys. There are certainly well over 6 million Jews in America.
- ❖ It looks like Jewish practice is increasing particularly around Passover seder attendance and fasting on Yom Kippur.
- ★ What's happening at TOO? Our children are growing up to be literate and attached to their Jewish identities. We are expanding our learning and understanding of all sorts of things – from Torah study to Hebrew. We may be small, but we are committed.

Jews have been around on this planet for a very long time. I think we'll be around for a long time to come, despite the headlines.

Let's be optimistic. Then let's continue working to strengthen our commitments: To community, to family, and to Temple Or Olam.

November 24, 2013

Your Board of Directors met on Sunday, Nov. 24, via conference call. Key points are below. The next meeting is Sunday, Dec. 22 at 7:00 pm via conference call.

- ☆ Membership Committee is working on a greeter program as a welcoming presence to our activities for both members and visitors. Research shows that personal contact is the best way to attract new members.
- ◆ Adult Education Committee received approval from the Board to charge fees for programs that have an expense component. All programs will be planned as much as possible to be revenue neutral.
- ☆ Approved the membership of Melanie Carty.
- Approved the concept proposed by President Earl Greenwald of a small ad hoc committee to evaluate our facilities and propose options for the future. This is another step in the Board's long-range planning effort.

### Our Partner in 3D: Dove House Children's Advocacy Center

Several Temple Or Olam members attended the fall Dove House fundraising luncheon on September 10. The Dove House Children's Advocacy Center serves sexually-abused children with concern for their personal welfare as well as their non-offending family members, focusing on healing. Prosecutors and government agencies work with Dove House to create a safe place for children to be able to share their experience and get justice. Dove House Advocates guide each child through the entire process from their interview with the authorities to court appearances and at trial. In one of the speeches at the event, an Advocate spoke of her struggle as she spends her days working with the children and helping them through their process: 'I can't explain the unexplainable; I just try to make sense of the unthinkable.'

The morning after the drash, the preacher did return the bill and thanked the man nicely. On the second Wednesday, he returned to the rich man with the same request, and he reimbursed him just the same on the following day. He did that five times. And the rich man noticed that the man returned to him the exact same bill that he had given him. So he asked: "I don't understand, rabbi: I see that you don't need the one hundred, so what are you borrowing it from me for in the first place?" And the preacher went: 'Okay, I don't need the money, but you understand, - with one hundred in your wallet, you just talk differently!"
