Choose Life — Honor the Sacred



Moses gathers all the people. All the congregation of the children of Israel. God has charged the Israelites with the gift of the Sabbath.

The Sabbath is not about doing nothing; it is about having. It is not about forbidding; it is about gifting. It is not about everyday. It is about what is sacred.

We need time not to be about ourselves and about stuff and

about our tasks, and about our jobs. Trust me: You won't remember the stuff you insisted you had to do three months after you made that claim. You will have forgotten it.

But you will not forget the deepest insights you experienced at Torah study that Shabbat morning in February. You will not forget the rich exchange and connectivity you gained with your community at a Shabbat service. You will not forget holding hands with your beloved walking on a path you made sacred because you were expressing your gratitude for the life you were living in that moment. These are the things of life. These things are sacred – they are sacred to us and to God.

Torah also reads: Those who do work on the Sabbath shall suffer death.

It seems like the kind of thing we dislike most in Torah: God is a mean bully in the sky, threatening doom and destruction for violating His commandments.

But there is hidden truth in this: Jobs and errands and responsibilities – we can *bury* ourselves in such things; we can kill ourselves with our doing and running and tasking. We kill our spirit. We kill the things that give us life. We waste away our lives in *doing*. We suffer a death of soul and spirit.

From the **Heart of the Orchard**


Start with the smallest steps. Light candles and say the blessings to bring in and honor the gift of Shabbat on Friday night. Bless your children. Go to services whenever they are offered. Consider joining Torah study now and then; you will be absolutely amazed at what happens in that sweet hour every Saturday morning. Take a walk. Ask yourself if you will remember the task you said you had to do just six weekends from now. Ask yourself if you will remember the joy you had in appreciating, again, the love your spouse has for you, the sweet time you took with your children, the moment you said a silent prayer of thanks to God for the crocus blooming in the garden, the scent of rain falling, the sight of a wren at the birdfeeder.

Eventually, you will want more and more of the sacred. You will long for it. The sacred gives meaning. The sacred gives life. Shabbat is sacred.

Shabbat is not about doing nothing. It's about practicing your consciousness of the divine. It's about acknowledging the sacred. It's about choosing life, acknowledging the preciousness of life itself.

Bless and keep the Sabbath and it will keep you.



Know your ALEPH-BET

Kaf (or dekaf?)



Kaf, the eleventh letter, is most probably derived from the pictograph of a hand; the word still means 'palm' or 'grip' both in Hebrew and in Arabic today. It can also refer to anything that is bent or hollow. By etymology

or lucky coincidence, I do not know which, the word for 'palm' (בר) supplies the first two letters to the word kippah (just add ה), so the next time you put one on your keppi, recall the words of Psalm 139:5: 'you have placed your palm over me' (בַּבָּבָה). The kippah symbolically reminds us of God being our Palm Pilot. (Then again, kaf is also the beginning of the words Kafka and kaftan.) The frequent assertions that kippah is the Hebrew source for the English word cap are, alas, not true; we have that word from Latin cappa 'cap, hood, cape.'

There is an itsy kaf in the Torah. When Sara passed away prematurely at age 127, Abraham came to mourn 'and to weep for her' (ולבכתה, Gen. 23.2). The smaller kaf is said to serve as a reminder to show restraint in our grieving. But why begrudge a man copious tears after one hundred years of marriage? The small kaf could also be a hedge, allowing a double reading: Without it, the word could be read u'lbita 'and for his daughter' - and, so that reading goes, Avraham did lose a daughter, Bakol, at the same time as Sara (this is from Rabbi Shalom Shachana M'Lublin). Then again, Rabbi Shalom Shachana may have been grasping at straws here, and we are well advised to separate the wheat from the kaf (as they do in a kafeteria). It is just as likely that the Hebrew 'and God blessed Avraham with Bakol' (Gen. 24:1) means 'and God blessed Avraham in everything' (בַּכֹּל).

As we are blessed with a Torah that makes us wrestle with the vowels, just as Jacob wrestled with that angel. And guess where that angel touched him, dislocating Jacob's hip: בְּרַ יֶּרֶךְּ b'chaf yerech in the kaf (hollow) of the thighbone.

Chocolate Almond Passover Cake

Gluten free, of course. Plus it's never too early to start planning.

- □ 1 cup sliced or slivered almonds, toasted
- □ 1 tablespoon plus 1 cup sugar, divided
- ☆ ½ cup cocoa

Optional: apple slices and honey

Preheat oven to 350 F. Grease bottom of a 10-inch tube pan.

Place toasted almonds and 1 tablespoon sugar in a food processor and process to near dust.

Melt butter, stir in cocoa, and cool.

Beat egg yolks in large bowl with ¾ cup sugar until pale yellow. Add cocoa mixture and mix well. Add ground almonds.

Beat egg whites until foamy. Gradually add remaining ¼ cup sugar, beating whites until stiff but not dry.

Add ¼ of egg whites to cocoa mixture, and stir to blend. Fold in remaining egg whites.

Pour into pan and bake until set (40-45 min.) Cool.

Optional decorations/toppings:

Apples slices - drizzle with honey

Another good option is a topping of strawberry jam and defrosted raspberries, cooked till thick with a bit of cornstarch (this is delicious, by the way, with the dark chocolate).

Strawberries and fresh whipped heavy cream.


